



Web Master: Dave said to check out the web site as the raffle item for regional, gas pump, looks really good.


Regional Chairmen: Harvey said next meeting will be sometime the first of March. Committee is working on getting ads and goodie bag items.

Silent Auction Rules for the March Meeting

Just as a refresher, here's the rules we will be following for our annual fund raiser, the silent auction at the March meeting. They're short and sweet, but knowing them will help keep this a fun evening and everything flowing smoothly!

- Step 1) Upon arrival pick up a bidder number
- Step 2) Pick up a bidder sheet for each item you're bringing.

Step 3) If you don't care what the item brings, place it on the regular bid table with your bid sheet. Please fill in the item. What ever amount it brings goes to the club and the item goes to the highest bidder. If there are no bids you get to take it back home.

Step 4) If you feel the item should bring \$20.00 or more, put the amount in the reserve line on the bid sheet, fill in the item, and place it on the reserve table. If the bid meets or exceeds your reserve, the money goes to the club and the item goes of the highest bidder. If your reserve is not met, you get to take it back home.

- Step 5) Minimum bid on all items must be \$1.00, all bids must be in increments of \$1.00.
- Step 6) All items should have some intrinsic value to entice a bid, no junk please.

National Youth Restoration Award Update



The Awards Banquet at MAFCA National Convention in Puyallup, Washington, was the setting to announce the nine 2014 recipients of the Model A Youth Restoration Award (MAYRA). MAYRA provides financial assistance to youth who are in the process of restoring their Model A's. MAYRA believes that these youth will be future ambassadors of the hobby. Getting and keeping youth involved with the hobby is a key to its future. Each recipient received \$2,000 in gift certificates. The Model A Ford Club of America and

the Model A Restorers Club plus fifty three Chapters and Regions, provided 85% of the funds for the awards.

Nate Spears, 17 is from Smithville, Missouri and is restoring a 1929 Fordor Briggs. He is a member of the Northwest Missouri Model A Club. In May of this year, Nate was attending the regular Model A club meeting when Sherry Winkinhofer said she would give him a Model A if he was interested. He writes "The next weekend, my whole family went up to her place and towed it out of her outbuilding, taking some parts that would get me started, but wouldn't complete the project. My scope on the whole project is to get it restored back to its original form when it rolled of the assembly line in 1929. Hoping to get it done prior to my senior prom next year. TOURING GUIDE or "RULES OF THE ROAD" '

Finally! Spring is here and the Model A Touring season is about to begin. Since we have a lot of new members in our Club and we have all gotten a bit "rusty" over the winter a review of a previously published article on "Touring" might be appropriate.

To some of us touring is the epitome of the Model A hobby. To jump into our eighty year old cars and travel the roads as our ancestors did brings us back to a slow and simpler kind of life where all seems right with the World.

First, let's discuss the tour itself. Tours can vary from a short out and back for lunch to a several day excursion such as the upcoming "Wichita Regional's". One of the certain facts of touring is that the longer the tour, the more preparation and planning will have to be accomplished to make it a success. The reasons we go on a tour are as varied as the individuals that participate.



Some tour just to enjoy the experience of driving and sightseeing while others like to partake of the camaraderie within the group while still others like to feel the adventure of the open road as our forefathers experienced it. Whatever reason we tour we would want it to be a pleasurable experience.

A few COMMON SENSE actions on our part while touring can lead to a much more pleasurable experience for all taking part with no hurt feelings or ruffled feathers to worry about.

Some guidelines to be adhered to in participating in a tour are as follows:

- a. A Leader must be appointed (whether it is two cars or twenty). The leader will brief the group as to route, rest/fuel and/or meal stops, destination and "touring etiquette".
- b. b. A Tail End car or "Sweeper" should be named whose responsibility includes the cohesiveness of the tour as a group. (The leader and tail end car must have operable two-way communications it is desirable that all of the group have CB radios).
- c. Rest stops should be scheduled at least once every hour if not sooner.
- d. Absolutely NO PASSING of others in the tour while in route.
- e. Space should be left between tour cars so as to let "modern cars" pass the group safely if they so desire.
- f. All tour cars should be alert as to the car ahead of and the car behind him. If either has to stop for any reason he should also stop and pull off the road. In this way the leader will be able to eventually stop and keep the group together as a whole. (the most violated of touring rules)
- g. If anyone has to leave the tour he should notify the leader to preclude the group waiting on him. h. Consideration should be given in large groups (more than ten cars) to splitting the group up and proceed as separate groups with ten or fifteen minute intervals between them.

A few common sense courtesies can go a long way into making a tour very enjoyable and have it operate in a smooth and SAFE manner. Have a Great Model A Day!

Color Matching 1928

Here are a few interesting excerpts from the January 1928 edition of Photoplay magazine. Carolyn Van Wyck wrote a monthly advice column and this is in response to a letter from a girl named Dorothy. This is just a few of the interesting paragraphs. To read the whole article or other interesting magazines, got to archive.org.



It is wise, of course, for the fair blonde with flaxen hair to wear clear whites, dark browns, all the blues and the delicate pastels. The red-haired fair girl can wear pale green, taupe, amber, yellow and pale blue. The chestnut-haired should favor bronze, darkest purple, pale pink and blue. The pale brunette, all shades of brown, sapphire

blue, orchid, burgundy and dark red. The olive brunette, browns, apricot, beige and terra cotta. The highly colored brunette, pale shades, pale blues, silver grays, old rose, coral. But it is the manner in which these basically becoming colors are combined that marks the successful costume.

Dorothy should unify her costumes by means of color. Black alone is a successful ensemble shade. Black shoes, stockings, dress and hat make a chic outfit, but blue or brown similarly used will mark her as dowdy. Of course, too many colors may not be worn simultaneously. Three is the out- side limit and two is better.

Dorothy's shoes should match either her dress or hat. Her handbag should match either her coat or hat, and the coat preferably because the two will be more used together. If her silk-stocking allowance is

limited — and whose isn't? — She should buy only nude shades which blend with everything.

It is not the gown one wears, or the hat or shoes that makes for distinction. It is the manner in which these garments are

e successfully combined that makes for smartness. Cheapness comes not from price tickets but from the carelessness of combined colors, designs and models. You can't slam on a forty-dollar hat on your head and make it look smart. But a clever girl will pull a little three-fifty coral felt cloche carefully down over her left eyebrow, contrast it cleverly with her grey chiffon dress, her nude stockings and her well-heeled grey pumps and make the crowd notice her as she passes.

Last summer when I was in Hollywood I lunched with Adrian, the costume designer at the DeMille studio. We are old friends and he was confiding to me his discouragement about dressing a very beautiful girl recently put under contract by the studio. Finally he exclaimed: "An ugly woman should thank God. A pretty girl, no matter how dressed, remains merely a pretty girl. But a plain girl carefully gowned attains immediate personality." That is the secret which Paris knows and which Dorothy must learn. When you haven't a perfect face and figure, scorn commonplace prettiness and go in for chic and distinction. After all, the most important single thing to spend on clothes is thought.

This is an interesting recipe from a 1927 cookbook put out by General Electric promoting the use of their modern refrigerator!

Jellied Chicken—No. 13

Put 1 quart chicken stock in sauce with 3 1/2 tablespoons gelatin and 1 1/2 tablespoons lemon juice. Add more seasonings if necessary and 2 egg whites slightly beaten, with the shells.



Stir constantly over the fire until boiling point is reached. Let stand away from the fire for ten minutes or until a decided separation takes place. Strain through double cheesecloth and make a layer 1/4 inches deep in large refrigerator pan.

Chill in refrigerator and when firm place the refrigerator pan in a large pan surrounded with water and ice cubes.

Garnish with hard cooked egg cut in fancy shapes and cress leaves and stems. Add a little jelly very carefully to hold decorations in place and return to refrigerator until firm.

Cut 1 cooked chicken or fowl and 1 pound cooked ham in strips and place one layer lengthwise on the jelly. Cover with jelly and return to chilling unit until firm. Fill the pan with alternate layers of chicken and ham and jelly and place in refrigerator but not in chilling unit until time for serving. Loosen around the edge with a spatula and turn out on a platter. Garnish with lettuce and cress, the remaining chicken jelly chopped and hard cooked egg cut in eighths.

Brands We Still Know

Charles L. Grigas worked previously for soda another company but quit and started his own in St. Louis MO in 1920. After doing well with an orange soda called "Howdy" but losing battle overall "Orange against Crush", he decided to try Lemon-Lime, a popular combination of the times.

In 1929 he developed a drink called "Bib-Label Lithiated Lemon-Lime Soda". It actual21'ly contained the mood altering substance lithium (which remained an ingredient until the 50's). In 1931 the name was changed to "7up Lithiated Lemon Soda", and soon to just "7up". 7up was the world's third best selling soft drink by the 1940's. There is a lot of controversy about what the name stands for but most sources seem to feel it's due to the original 7 natural ingredients.

I posted this last year in March, figured it would be a good idea to post again. A reminder spring will be here soon. It is time to start thinking about getting your Model A's ready for the road.

SEASONAL MAINTENANCE CHECK LIST

- 1. Inspect fan for cracks
- 2. Check water pump for leaks and end play
- 3. Check fan belt adjustment
- 4. Inspect radiator hoses
- Check radiator water level
- 6. Oil generator bushings at each end of generator
- 7. Check carburetor and fuel lines for leaks
- 8. Drain/inspect sediment bowl
- 9. Check air cleaner
- 10. Check/change crankcase oil
- 11. Check generator charging rate, adjust as required
- 12. Check for tight electrical connections at generator
- 13. Test all lights (head, tail, stop, dash, dome)
- 14. Check for tight coil connections
- 15. Check for tight connections at ammeter and terminal box
- 16. Check distributor point gap (.016-.018)
- 17. Check engine timing
- 18. Check battery water level
- 19. Clean battery posts and clamps
- 20. Tighten battery ground connection
- 21. Check wiper blade rubber
- 22. Tighten accessory mountings (windwings)
- 23. Check tires for breaks, cracks, and abnormal wear
- 24. Tighten all wheel lug nuts
- 25. Inspect exhaust system for leaks
- 26. Adjust service brakes
- 27. Check toe in

We Roamed West in a Ford Model A

When my friend Helen and I told everyone that we were "going West" in the summer of 1930, our families were worried and the neighbors were flat-out scandalized. The idea of two girls going off alone like that! Helen was 18, and I was 24. I'd just put a down payment on a \$600 Ford Model A, and we planned to drive to California to visit Helen's relatives.

On June 13—Friday the 13th—we drove out of Shinglehouse, Pennsylvania, loaded down with a gas stove, folding table, food boxes that were bolted to the running boards, a burlap bag filled with canned goods, and draw curtains for the windows. What heady excitement we felt, alone on the open road, free to roam the West at will! We were thrilled to fly in the face of convention. We were pioneers! We'd show the folks back home we could take care of ourselves! Economy was our watchword. All we really had to buy was milk, bread and fruit. Gas was just 8 cents a gallon, and Helen became adept at servicing the car while I fixed most of our meals.



Camping in the Car; We stopped at municipal campgrounds to use the kitchen and showers. When we were ready to sleep, the Ford's divided front seats converted into our "beds." We stashed the stove and provisions under the car, drew the curtains and locked the doors. Our adventure was going pretty well until we reached Carroll, lowa. There, a car shot out from a side street and smashed into the front door, shattering the glass and destroying a food box. My heart sank. "So ends our adventure," I thought. "The folks back home were right." "Not so," said Helen. "We'll get the car fixed and go on." We found a repairman named Tony who fixed the door and built a new food box—all for \$30. We lost our canned foods that day, too. We'd tied the bag to the rear bumper, and the bottom wore through. That night at our campground, we overheard a truck driver chuckling about something odd he'd seen—a trail of smashed canned goods strewn along the road. Helena and I had to laugh, and the next day our spirits soared even higher as we took to the road again.


Sleeping in Splendor: Yellowstone was the high point of our trip. Camping in a grove of trees on the shore of Yellowstone Lake, we slept under four blankets to keep warm. Here gas was priced at an exorbitant 12 cents a gallon, and we were forced to take cabins at \$1.50 a night! On to Lake Tahoe, Truckee Pass and Sacramento. We continued through the world's largest peach and apricot orchards, where we bough giant baskets of fruit for 10 cents. At Yosemite, we spread our blankets over soft pine needles and slept beneath the giant sequoias and a blanket of stars. Farther south, in California, Helen's relatives treated us to concerts, picnics, beach parties, museums and a lovely overnight trip to Catalina Island.

On July 30, we began the trip back home to Pennsylvania. It was a cool evening when we reached the Grand Canyon, which surely is the world's most sublime sight. Our second morning there, we were on a mule, heading into the canyon. We had pictures taken of us dangling our feet over the brink of a 1,100-foot drop to the river. "That'll shake up our folks," Helen said. After the Grand Canyon, the rest of the trip was pretty tame. We just wanted to get home! On Aug. 17, we drove into Potter County, Pennsylvania. The daring wanderers of the West were welcomed home at last.

Coil Polarity

Most coils are marked positive and negative at the primary terminals. When in stalling or connecting a coil, be sure to make the connections as shown in Figs. 15 and 16.



If perchance the coil is not marked as to its polarity, it can be checked by holding any high tension wire about ¼ away from its spark plug terminal with the engine running. Insert the point of a wooden lead pencil between the spark plug and the wire, Fig. 17. If the spark flares and has a slight orange tinge on the spark plug side of the pencil, polarity is correct. If the spark flares on the cable side, coil connections should be reversed.
