# **Shatto Dairy Tour July 11th**

It was a beautiful day for a Model A Tour to Shatto Milk! We had 21 members touring the back roads. Unfortunately, Shatto Milk had to cancel our tour due to increased COVID-19 restrictions. We did get to go in the visitor's center and taste-test some delicious varieties of milk. The gift shop was also open for checking out their cheese curds and other products.

The group then drove to a nice park nearby and enjoyed our sack lunches at a social distance, of course! There was plenty of time for visiting with our Model A friends. It was a really nice tour and a fun day!















Often called a newsboy cap, these caps are very similar to the driving caps (or flat cap) of today. However there is a distinct difference if you want to truly look era. The body of the Model A cap is round, and fuller instead of having flat sides. It was meant to shade the ears as well as the face.

This style wasn't worn just by newsboys. Although it was primarily a worker's hat, often seen on the docks or in the factories, upper class gentlemen also wore them for casual wear and sporting activities such as golf. It quickly became popular as a driving hat due to the fact that there was no high crown to flatten against a car roof, important in the days of leaf springs!

These hats were often eight paneled, although I have found some one piece versions. As you can see below, they came in an amazing variety! Plaids, tweeds, cashmeres, "fancy weaves" and "Loud novelty fabrics" are just a few of the descriptions in this catalog. You could chose from pleated backs, rubber lined visors (rain proof), silk or satin linings, and even "soil-less" leather sweatbands. Colors were mostly as expected with greys, browns and tans, with a few coming in green" or surprisingly powder blue! The illustrations below are from a 1929 wholesale catalog from the Rossett Manufacturing Corp.







This recipe is from a 1928 cookbook What Salad, What Dessert- - JELL-O 1928. Jell-O was trademarked in 1897 and lemon was one of the original flavors, along with strawberry, raspberry and orange. Surprisingly, lime Jell-O didn't come out until 1930! The company struggled until 1904 when it began distributing free cookbooks, a then new marketing strategy.

#### Paradise Pudding

1 pkg Lemon Jell-O

1 pint boiling water

12 maraschino cherries, coarsely cut

6 macaroons, crushed

1/2 cup almonds, blanched

4 tablespoons sugar

12 marshmallow, finely cut

1/4 tsp salt

1 cup cream, whipped



Dissolve Jell-O in boiling water. Chill. When slightly thickened, beat with rotary egg beater until of consistency of whipped cream.

Combine nuts, marshmallows, cherries, macaroons, sugar, and salt. Add to Jell-O. Fold in cream. Turn into loaf pan  $7 \times 5 \times 3$ . Chill until firm.

Unmold and serve in 3/4-inch slices. Serves 8.

### Brands We Still Know By Sherry Wink

The world's first aerial crop dusting company started in 1925 in Georgia. Named Huff Daland Dusters, they flew a Huff-Daland Duster, a plane designed to dust cotton fields the fight against boll weevils. Soon a group of local investors led C.E. by Woolman acquired the company. Delta Air Service incorporated was in December of 1928 and Woolman became the new airline's first CEO. The new

name was representative of the Mississippi Delta region. The first passenger operations began in June 1929. They flew from Dallas to Jackson Mississippi, with several stops along the way. Trouble rose up in 1930 when the airline lost their airmail contract to another company which then bought up Delta Air Service's assets. Woolman and others bought back the crop-dusting section of the airline and incorporated again as Delta Air Corporation in December 1930. By 1934 they had another airmail contract and started expanding their service area. The name changed again in 1945, becoming Delta Air Lines. The first international Delta flights began in 1953.







# **Walt's Old Time Tech Tip**

#### CARE AND MAINTENANCE OF THE MODEL"A" HORN

The Model A horn, if properly cared for, will produce a high quality AHOOGA sound for many years, but this is only possible when it is kept clean and properly oiled. With a good battery, correctly oiled and properly adjusted, the horn should sound without the engine running. Service experience has proven that corrosion on the terminal block or lack of oil is usually what causes the horn to not work correctly. A properly grounded horn is essential for good operation.


Ford recommended that the horn be serviced once a month.

The first step in maintenance is to remove the motor cover from the rear of the horn using the small screw on the left back side. Do not con-fuse this screw with the adjusting screw. The adjusting screw is lar-ger in diameter. These procedures work the same on all makes of Model A horns. They lubricate the same and have the same issues.

Next, look at the horn terminal connector block (connector assembly) for corrosion or loose connectors. This area should be a bright copper or brass color. If not, clean with a paste made from baking soda and water. Use an old toothbrush or small fine bristle brass brush to clean off the corrosion. Rinse with a small amount of water, trying not to get any on the motor. This area can be dried with compressed air using 4 psi or less.

The next step is to inspect the motor brushes. Be sure that these are least 3/16 inch in length or longer. Replace if they are less than that in length. (Instruction for replacing them are available in the Les Andrews Model A Ford Mechanics Handbook.) Also check that the brushes are not cracked, chipped or broken in any way. Most brushes are workable as you find them, but they do wear thin.

The next item to check is the commutator. To clean the commutator, rotate it while holding 400 grit Emery paper against it until it is clean. Use a Popsicle stick to clean the gap between the commutator segments. Do not use metal, or



damage will occur to the commutator. Note: Some people call the commutator the armature, but they are not the same part. The commutator is the area where the brushes rub. The wires from the armature are attached here. The armature is the area that rotates inside the field coils. It is the main current-carrying winding of a motor.

The attached figures show the felt washers or pads at each end of the armature. These need to be oiled with two drops of light machine oil (3 in 1 oil). Do not over oil these pads. Use dielectric grease to coat the terminal connector block (connector assembly) and the two incoming connectors. This will help in preventing corrosion, and it will promote better electrical connections.

The last thing to do is to replace the horn motor cover. This takes caution because if tightened too hard, it can affect the sound. If too loose, the cover could fall off. Adjust the horn accordingly. Changing temperatures can affect horn performance.

Points to remember are: first, that the horn is ground activated. Second, be sure it is well oiled, or it may be hard to start or slow to react. Third, if the horn does not work, it may be due to corrosion or loose connections under the motor cover.

Maintain your horn with proper care and it will reward you with that great AHOOGA sound!

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
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
