A Small but Necessary Accessory

In these days of disposable tissues and wet wipes, it's rare to find someone who carries an actual fabric handkerchief. But in the era, I imagine every one's dresser had a drawer full! Plain cotton for everyday, silk or linen for dressier or more formal events. Men's carried quite large squares of approx. 15 to 16 1/2 inches, while ladies' were a more delicate size of 9 3/4 or so. A few larger women's squares could be found at 13" in size.

Ladies' handkerchiefs came in a wide variety of styles, colors, textures, and purposes. Hand-embroidered, edged with crocheted or tatted lace. Made of silk pongee, cotton lawn, or Irish linen. Hemstitched, open-work, woven borders, printed designs-the varieties are endless. These essential items could be bought by the boxful for simple cotton versions. More elaborate ones might be in a lovely box, perhaps as a set of three.

Men also had an amazing selection to choose from. The same textiles as ladies, just in larger sizes. Minus the lace, of course. But men could get fancy with silk or linen options. They could buy handkerchiefs to match their ties, or even get their hankies monogrammed.





No one left home without at least one of these essentials tucked away somewhere. And I'm sure many a mom and grandmas had a lot more than one in their pockets!



A fun recipe from a Wesson Oil ad from 1928. Note there is no sugar in this recipe, All sweetness comes from the berries and a little sugar added to the berries!

Strawberry Shortcake

1/3 cup of Wesson Oil

2 cups flour

12 cup milk

4 tsp baking powder

3/4 tsp salt



Sift together the dry ingredients and stir in the milk, then the oil. Divide the

dough and on a board roll or pat into two rounds nine inches in diameter. Place one in a deep round pie tin or on a baking sheet. Brush with Wesson Oil and place the other round on top. Bake for twenty=five minutes in a hot oven of 400 degrees F. raising the temperature to 425 degrees F. the last ten minutes to brown well.

With a fork lightly separate the two sections and butter the lower one. Cover with slightly mashed and sugared berries. Put on the upper section. Cover with whipped cream and garnish with whole berries. Serve preferably while still warm.

Brands We Still Know

A group of clock builders headed by Charles Stahlberg chose Peru, Illinois as their new business location in 1884. They were basing their designs on a new idea of Stahlbergs. They called their new company "The United Clock Company" incorporated 1885. Unfortunately, the new in company quickly went bankrupt. Reorganized as the "Western Clock Company" in 1887, it again failed and was then again reorganized it in 1888, this time as the Western Clock Manufacturing Company, which finally was viable. The company was a significant maker of dollar watches,

beginning in 1899 and until the 1990s. The dollar watch was intended to be affordable to any working person. The company patented "The Big Ben' alarm clock in 1908 and began marketing it in 1909. In 1910, this innovative design became the first alarm clock advertised nationally, with ads placed in the Saturday Evening Post. The companies trademark of "Westclox" was first used on the Big Ben alarm clock as of 1910, but was officially trademarked until 1916. In 1919, the company incorporated as the Western Clock Co., Ltd. In 1931, the company merged with the Seth Thomas Clock Company.

MODEL A GROUP TOURING GUIDELINES



<u>Safety</u> is the number one priority in any tour; safety of the participants, and to the public.

III - PARTICIPATING IN A TOUR

-GETTING READY FOR THE TOUR-

- Have your Model A in good working order.
- Consider installing seat belts and turn signals Bring your CB/walkie-talkie and cell phone.
- Put tools, parts, and supplies in your Model A.

- ASSEMBLING FOR THE TOUR-

- Arrive with a <u>full tank of gas</u>!
- Be attentive during the drivers' meeting. This is when you'll get a map, driving directions, and special instructions about the tour.
- Depart the parking lot in the order directed by the Tour Leader. If the group of Model A's is larger than 5, the Tour Leader may break the Model A's into two or more groups that will depart a few minutes apart. This is safer than a large group.

-DURING THE TOUR-

- Listen for important directions on the CB club channel, or your cell phone. Don't use the CB for idle chit-chat.
- You are responsible for keeping the person behind you in sight. Check your rearview mirror often, especially when making a turn or at a fork in the road. Slow down so the person following can see where you are turning. Generally maintain a safe distance behind the car in front of you, but don't lag behind the group. Notify the Tour Leader if you or another car gets left behind.
- Check your rearview mirror for faster modern cars/trucks moving up among the Model A's. Use the CB or flash your lights to alert the Model A's in front of you of a passing modern car. Back off to allow the car to pass. Holding faster drivers behind often creates very dangerous situations.
- Clearly signal all turns. When waiting to make a left turn, keep your wheels straight ahead until you are ready to turn. (If you're struck from behind with your wheels turned left, you will be propelled into oncoming lanes with possible tragic results.)
- **Run with your lights on.** At your discretion, you may choose to leave your lights off if concerned about battery discharging.
- Remain in the same lane. If a lane change is needed, the last car should shift lanes first and allow the others to merge in.
- Notify the Leader if you must leave the tour. Making a side stop could lead other Model A's to leave the tour route or wonder if you are experiencing problems or are lost. If you must leave the tour for gas, notify a nearby Model A.
- **Carry a cell phone with you**. Carry your cell phone and a of list of club cell phone numbers with you on a tour for emergency use. But no texting while driving!

Remember: Safety is more important than anything else! If something seems unsafe, don't do it!

"HIDDEN" OIL POINTS

While pampering my 31 Coupe (oil/filter change, lube, etc.), I happened upon Paul Shinn's video on just that subject. It's an excellent video, covering all aspects of doing the job right. I thought maybe I should bring to light some of the "hidden" areas that need lubrication also...spots that are often overlooked, or forgotten.



Using a 1 oz. plastic bottle with a needle tip (from Amazon, Hobby Lobby, etc.), fill with 30W oil to reach the following: Hood hinges (3), Door hinges, Horn armature felts (2), Distributor "base oiler" cup and (if you have one) the hole in the top of Cam Screw, throttle linkage cups (2) (mounted to back of block), and all brake rod Clevis Pins. Also, be SURE to squirt some oil from your oil can onto the front engine mount where it passes through the front crossmember. Strange noises can come from that area if it isn't periodically oiled. And don't forget to periodically lubricate the speedometer cable with a dry graphite.

With a good spray lubricant (i.e. Lucas Oil Red N Tacky Grease, White lithium grease, etc.), spray the brake cross shaft where it passes through the frame. Also remember to add some lube up inside the parking brake mechanism and inside door latches. And don't forget to put a small dab of silicone grease on the points cam inside your distributor. Your point's rubbing block will thank you.

These are some of the "hidden" areas that require lubrication every so often, to help keep your car in tip-top working condition for years to come. Be sure to check out Paul Shinn's excellent video series on this subject:



March 1928 Ford Service Bulletin

GASOLINE TANK AND RADIATOR FILLER CAPS

While the outward appearance of the gasoline tank and radiator filler caps are the same, the inside construction of the caps is different. The gasoline tank cap has a vent hole drilled in the center of the raised portion (see Fig. 520) which allows air to seep in through the six openings in the cap and prevent a vacuum forming in the tank.

Care must be exercised to see that the caps are not mixed. Should a radiator cap be installed on the gasoline tank it would cause a vacuum to form in the tank and prevent the gasoline flowing to the carburetor.

TECHNICAL TORQUE!



From the March 1928 Ford Service Bulletin



The distance from the back of the driver's seat to the steering wheel rim measures $13 \frac{1}{2}$, this adjustment having been found most satisfactory for the average driver.

If, however, an owner prefers to have the seat moved closer to the wheel, it can be easily done by removing hinge pin (see B, Fig. 467) loosening nut "A"

and turning the seat hinge to position shown by dotted line. This moves the seat 1 ³/₄ " closer to the wheel. After making adjustment, be sure to replace cotter key in hinge pin and tighten lock nut. If desired, the front passenger seat can be moved up in the same manner. **For Sale**: 1930 Ford Tudor. Excellent condition. Overland Park, Kansas. \$18,500 or best offer.

Tech Tip from MARC

-From a Technical seminar presented by Ron Ehrenhofer

Many members are now using John Deere corn head grease in the steering gear instead of the usual 600w oil.

The corn head grease is a polyurea grease that is thixotropic. It is a gel when resting and turns into a liquid when under use.

This makes it perfect for steering boxes because of how much they tend to leak.
