
must enter 63rd St. from Bell Road. 63rd St. from Hwy 9 will be blocked off.

Suspenders!

Suspenders were designed to distribute weight evenly across the body, and hold the pants up securely. In our era, they came in many bright colors and were considered a stylish accessory. There was no one design for these helpful accessories. The straps could be thick and strong for hefty men, or lighter weight for young men. The web fabric they are made out of could be made of elastic or non-elastic webbing, with a few models adding springs to the straps. The non-elastic model A's often had an elastic insert on the back to add the needed flexibility. The ends and trim could be leather or cording. In one instance, they used chain! Backs could cross over, or come down to one strap. A few were self adjusting in length.

Colors were all over the gamut, and stripes, dots, checks and brocades could all be found. A few povelty version in a

few novelty version in a different catalog included an aviation design, and a modernistic dancer!

This 1931 Crisco advertisement included several interesting recipes to try:

Blackberry Roly Poly

2 cups flour 5 tbsp Crisco ½ tsp salt ½ cup milk 1 egg beaten 2 tbsp sugar 3 tsp baking powder



Sift dry ingredients. Cut in Crisco until mealy in appearance. Add beaten

egg and milk and blend. Toss on floured board and roll out about $1\!\!\!/ 4"$ thick. Brush with melted Crisco.

3 cups blackberries ½ TSP ginger 1 tbsp Crisco ¾ cup sugar 1/8 TSP salt

Spread dough with berries which have been mixed with sugar and spices. Dot with Crisco. Roll up as for jelly roll. Place in Criscoed pan and bake in moderate oven $(375 \ ^\circ F)$ for 25 minutes. Serve with favorite pudding sauce.

Brands We Still Know

Dentist Thomas Bramwell Welch was a Methodist who objected to wine being used in communion services. But It was hard to have a steady supply of grape juice, with no refrigeration at that time. In 1869. after vears of experimenting, finally Welch perfected a juice pasteurization process in his kitchen and began selling "Dr. Welch's Unfermented Wine" to churches. Eventually, as demand grew, he formed the Welch's Fruit Juice Company. Later, when the prohibition movement started to grow, and Welch's Grape Juice was the



only nonalcoholic fruit drink on the market, it was used as a substitute drink.

In 1918, the company answered a call from the military, and developed the first every grape marmalade, called Grapelade, which was provided to soldiers overseas. In 1923, Welch released a new product to the market as Welch's grape jelly.

Note: PB&J is purported to have been invented during WWII when soldiers took pre-sliced bread, topped it with Welch's jelly and added peanut butter for protein.

Tech Tips— It Stalls at a Stop

Snyder's Catalog part:

Tech Tips— It Stalls at a Stop By Tom Endy This is a common complaint I have heard from Model A owners. My experience has been that it has to do with the Zenith carburetor. On most forums numerous theories are offered; many of them contradictory. Every once in a while, I encounter a Zenith that defies being fixed so that it does not stall at a stop. It can be very frustrating. However, I think I may have hit upon the problem.

I recall attending a Zenith seminar years ago at a MAFCA meet, conducted by Herman Reise, who was an old fellow since passed away, that knew quite a bit about Zenith carburetor restoration. He made a statement that stuck in my mind. He said that "there hasn't been a decent throttle plate produced in 50 years". Unfortunately, he did not elaborate.

Occasionally I find a throttle plate where someone has filed a groove in it right where it approaches the hole in the throat of the carburetor for the idle circuit. I have never figured out why this is done. I think that doing this would upset the flow of the proper amount of air to the idle circuit.

Snyder's Model A catalog has an interesting statement concerning the reproduction throttle plate they offer. "Made of brass as original with correct angles on the edges. USA".

Recently I was rebuilding two Zeniths that road tested perfectly until I came to a stop, then the engine stalled. Nothing I did to the Zeniths resolved the problem. The float level was set to different heights a number of times, the throttle shaft was replaced, the throttle bosses re-bushed, the float replaced. The float valve was replaced with a Viton tip. Flow tested jets installed. All the passageways were open.

It was then I began to think about the throttle plate itself. If the throttle plate does not close on the idle circuit hole in the throat properly it could adversely affect the flow of air to the idle circuit and the transfer from run to idle would be disrupted. Maybe old Herman was on to something. Maybe back in the J.C. Whitney days the Model A Kingdom was flooded with throttle plates with the angles not ground correctly, that has continued to the present day.

I ordered two throttle plates from Snyder and installed them in the two Zeniths that both stalled when coming to a stop. Problem resolved!

This was quite a revelation. It could be that there is a multitude of incorrectly ground throttle plates floating around, or it could be that some of the originals that have survived have become worn such that they do not close on the idle hole properly. Whatever is the case, when rebuilding a Zenith I will be installing new throttle plates from Snyder. I suspect some of the other better suppliers, such as Bratton's, are offering the same throttle plate. However, they don't say so in their catalog. The small hole in the throat of the upper casing allows air to flow into the idle circuit when the throttle is closed. The throttle plate closes such that half of the hole just peeks above the closed throttle plate.

As found in the "Model A Flyer", the official newsletter of the Model A Ford Club of New South Wales:

Venting Your Rear Axle Housing.

Originally the rear axle assembly was vented through a hole in the transmission shift tower. Installing sealed bearings in the transmission and/ or installing an overdrive in the torque tube will disrupt this vent system.

The resulting pressure caused by heat and churning of the lubricant may cause grease to be pushed from the rear axle in undesired locations– such as into the brakes and past the banjo gaskets onto the garage floor.

Installing a separate vent for the rear axle is relatively simple, once you have fabricated the needed part.



A solution is to modify one of the banjo bolts by drilling a 7/64" through it and counter boring the head to accept a short piece of 5/16" steel tubing. The steel tubing is brazed to the bolt head and is bubbled on the opposite end to secure a length of flexible vinyl tubing.

This bolt simply replaces one of the two top bolts on the assembly.
