

## **Social Distancing Tour!**



### Tail Pipe Clamp Installation Tip

I have found a unique pair of vise grips At Harbor Freight, about \$10, used for removing oil filters and such.



They work really great on installing the tail pipe clamp.

This allows the compression of the tail pipe clamp so the nut can be easily started on the bolt, then the wrench is removed and you can tighten the nut with two wrenches until you can insert a cotter pin. Do not tighten any more than that, on either the regular or insulated clamps.

### **BUGS**

This is not a department for entomologists, but something practical — something that will help you lighten your labors and increase your profit by giving you a key to the cause of the most common troubles in certain models, and their remedy...

FORD MODEL A — We have had lots of trouble with these models leaking oil around the crankshaft front end, through the timing case. We have stopped these leaks by simply installing a funnel oil slinger ring on the crankshaft.

Many of these models will suck oil up around the intake valves, even with new valves and guides. To prevent this, shellac gasket to valve door cover and weight down till stuck tight. Cut out a piece of the gasket one inch long between bolt holes along the top edge and bolt up tight. The cut-out vents the compartment and stops oil consumption. Valve packing should also be installed.

### Doris Day's 1930 Ford Model A Roadster sells for \$96K

Nearly one year after Doris Day's death, her fans made sure she'll never be forgotten, gobbling up items owned by the Hollywood legend, singer, and animal rights activist. In a weekend estate auction hosted by Julien's, fans of "America's Sweetheart" placed online bids for more than 1100 items from her residence in Carmel-by-the-Sea, California, known as "Overlook." Day died of complications from pneumonia on May 13, 2019. Day would have celebrated her 98th birthday on April 3.

Julien's said that the auction generated more than \$3 million, far exceeding presale estimates of \$300,000–\$600,000. All proceeds benefit the Doris Day Animal Foundation (www.ddaf.org).





Topping the list of items sold was Day's 1930 Ford Model A, which she owned for more than 35 years and was frequently seen driving around Carmel. The rumble-seat roadster, which Day nicknamed "Buttercup," sold for \$96,000, more than nine times its estimate of \$10,000.

The car was a gift from a fan and Day had it restored in the early 1980s. It is powered by a 40-horsepower L-head 200.5-cubic-inch four-cylinder engine, mated to an unsynchronized three-speed manual transmission. Among the Model A's features are dual running boards, front and rear bumper guards, side and rear view mirrors, rumble seat, mounted spare tire, wire wheels, and four -wheel mechanical drum brakes. The odometer reads 35,142 miles.

Included is Day's personalized license plate "1 Bixby," a reference to her nickname, "Clara Bixby," given to her by good friend Billy De Wolfe decades before. It also has written starting and shut-off instructions taped to the dash.





Day used the Model A on her 1985–86 cable-television talk show, Best Friends, often taking her guests for a spin. That included Rock Hudson, who publicly revealed the toll that AIDS was taking on his body. Hudson died on October 2, 1985. "He was very sick," Day said later. "But I just brushed that off, and I came out and put my arms around him and said, 'Am I glad to see you."

Day's best-known films are those in which she co-starred with Hudson, chief among them 1959's Pillow Talk, for which she was nominated for the Academy Award for Best Actress.

But as always, there is always an exception to that always—short sleeves were just starting to appear in sports wear such as polo shirts, worn by real polo players, and other professional sports such as tennis. But the average man's casual or dress shirts had long sleeves. Men's shirts were not just white, or a light pastel. Below are a few fabric swatches from a 1928 "Superior Textile Mills" wholesale catalog. These shirts offered the option for a detached or attached collar. One last note before the pictures—note the location of the pocket,

### Gruyere Soufflé


This is a little hot entree or hors d'oeuvre which has the double advantage of being generally liked and rapidly made.

### Brands We Still Know By Sherry Wink

The I. M. Singer & Co was established in 1851 by Isaac M. Singer. Singer was a theater manager, inventor, and already a millionaire. His machine was the first practical sewing machine for home use, but used the basic design developed by Elias Howe. Howe won a patent infringement suit again Singer ins 1854, but eventually reached a settlement that resulted in a patent sharing accord among the major

firms. But Singer quickly consolidated enough patents to enable him to start mass producing his fast selling machine, and by 1860 was the largest sewing machine maker in the world. He built their first large factory in New Jersey in 1863. In 1885 the company produced its first "vibrating shuttle", a vast improvement over the original design. Singer displayed the first practical electric sewing machine in 1889, and started selling them in 1910. Singer marketed his machines directly to the consumer – women. His marketing focused on the role of women and the home, evoking ideals of virtue, modesty, and diligence.

Note: During World War II, Singer suspended sewing machine production to work on weapons manufacturing. Norden bomb sights and M1 Carbine rifle receivers were among the items supplied from his factories.

### Authentic Model A Colors in a Spray Can

Achieving an authentic look is important to many of us who choose to restore our car back to its original condition. In the area of painting, it becomes difficult without the training and equipment of a professional. However, for small items such as interior trim and other metal components, spray cans are a viable option. Once you have the paint code in hand (acquired from guidance in the MAFCA Paint & Finish Guide and the PPG or DuPont customer service group), your local distributor for such popular brands can provide the authentic colors in 12 oz. spray cans. Color matching can also be achieved by providing a good sample (I used the windshield visor) to be analyzed at your distributor by hand held color matching equipment.

The spray cans are typically a single component acrylic enamel providing ease of application, excellent shine and durability. Of course, good paint finish requires proper metal prep regardless of the spray equipment utilized. The spray can shown below contains the popular Copra Drab for a 1930 coupe utilized to paint the dash panel depicted.



### **Speedometer Oscillation**

One of the annoying (but not serious) habits your Model A may develop is where the speedometer seems to be oscillating... it won't stay still so you can read it. The usual cause of this phenomenon is that the interior of the cable has become dry and may even be rusty.

The way to correct this is to loosen the instrument panel and pull it out as far as you can without damaging the components. Then remove the top end of the cable from the speedometer - you may need a pair of pliers to loosen the nut. Now reach into the cable housing with your pliers and pull the inner cable all the way out. Look it over for rusty spots, wear, or frizzy wires. You might wish to

take the opportunity to install new one. Whether you install the old one or a new one, lubricate the end going in first with chassis lube; then feed in the rest of the cable, applying liberal amounts of grease. Reinstall the completed cable into the speedometer and finish by securing the instrument panel in place.

### **Converting Ford Cutout to Solid State**

#### Found at MAFCA.com/downloads

- 1. File or grind off spot welds on bottom plate of the cutout (2 or 3 of them). 2. Turn cutout upside down in a piece of 2" pipe and drive the cover off.
- 3. Remove four (4) 6-32 screws in the sides of the coil bracket (not from the bottom). See Figure 1.
- 4. Unsolder the large coil from the small bracket and the small wire from the base.
- 5. With a hacksaw, cut off one side of the coil bracket and continue to cut through the base of the coil and its core. See Figure 2.
- 6. In the remaining side of the bracket, drill a hole starting with a 1/4" bit and work up to 1/2". This is so the hole will be round. See Figure 2.
- 7 At this point, the cover and base may be cad plated with no ill effects to the insulators. Before plating, degrease and lightly sandblast or wire brush the metal to remove rust.
- 8. To install the diode, set it in the hole and press it in using a 7/16" or 1/2" deep socket or a tool designed for installing diodes. Use a 5/8" socket so support the bracket under the diode.
- 9. Bend the diode lead over and solder it to the small bracket. See Figure 3.
- 10. Reinstall the cover (B to battery terminal) solder at seal.






An interesting article I found in a recent newsletter from the "A" Model Club, Model A Restorers' Club, Norway Region: (Translated from Norwegian!)


A common problem on "A" Ford's lens is that the "ears" around the periphery are broken or partially broken. Even though otherwise the lens is perfectly fine, this causes the springs which should hold the glass in the lantern to not properly attach.

Now there is a type of adhesive on the market that cures with ultraviolet light, and is suitable for rebuilding such "lantern glass ears" and thus make the glasses usable again. The repair will be hidden by the lamp ring, so that the lamp with repaired glass will look completely OK. The adhesive is available under different brands: Bondic or 5 Second Fix, and several videos have been posted on YouTube showing the usage.

The technique is relatively easy to learn, you build up a small layer, illuminate it so that it hardens, and add new layers until you achieve the desired result. The attached pictures show glass before and after such repair.



This is how it looks.



Build new "ears" on lenses with glue that are just as solid like glass



Even a fairly large fracture can be repaired with this Method. Here it is filled a little extra at the upper edge to prevent water intrusion, and the lip has been moved slightly to the left compared to the original location. And it does not matter, doesn't seem to anyway.



It builds up gradually



At the first attempt and by training in the technique, it can be helpful in putting a piece of cardboard during the build-up point. Remove afterwards and scrape away scraps of cardboard



Remember new cork gaskets around the headlamp before finishing assembly



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
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
