

Swim Suits




Famous designer Elsa Schiaparelli designed bathing suits in 1928. This one was sold by Saks 5th Avenue. The design is a stylized sailboat.

Swim suits in the Model A days were going through a transition period. Just a few short years ago, beach police were jailing women for showing too much leg. By the late 20's, suits were sleeveless, and moving up the legs. The beginning of he modern one piece can definitely been seen in these styles.

In the early 1930s the backs of bathing suits began to show more skin and reach towards the waistline. 1931 Ad.

Going with our beach theme, here's a recipe from the 1931 Searchlight Recipe Book, published in 1931 by Household Magazine which as headquartered in Topeka, Kansas. The book is filled with recipes from readers of the magazine, as well as staff of the publication, who cooked and baked and tested all the concoctions within. An early precursor of "America's Test Kitchen," the editors of the cookbook describe The Household Searchlight as "a service station conducted for the readers of The Household Magazine

Fish Chowder Recipe

- 1 Tablespoon lard or bacon grease
- 2 cups shredded cooked Salmon
- 1 cup diced potatoes 1 small onion, diced
- 1 cup cooked tomatoes 2 cups broth
- 1 Tablespoon butter Salt & Pepper

Melt 1 Tablespoon of lard/bacon grease in a large saucepan over medium heat. Sauté onion until slightly browned.

In 1931, Jantzen gave women the option of tanning sans lines by introducing The Shouldaire. Rubberized yarn was combined into the fabric to give the swimsuit a stretchier feel, while a "molded fit" defined the bust line and helped the swimsuit stay put.

Brands We Still Know

Jantzen bathing suits are still top of the line today. John A. Zehntbauer and Carl Jantzen founded the Portland Knitting Company in 1919 in Portland, Oregon. They produced sweaters, woolen hosiery and other knitted goods. In 1913, the company was asked to provide a rowing suit for a local rowing club. Further requests and refinements eventually led to a one-piece garment of pure wool designed by Carl Jantzen that became the prototype

for the rib-stitch swimsuits that were first produced in 1915 under the Jantzen name.

Jantzen's Diving Girl logo made her appearance in advertisements in 1920, wearing a daring red suit, stocking cap and stockings. In 1921, the company began the first company ever to call their product a "swimsuit" instead of a "bathing suit". They started using the tagline "The Suit That Changed Bathing to Swimming" in 1923 and added the Diving Girl logo to the suits.

Interesting note: The Diving Girl were available as decals that showed up on automobile windshields across the country. In 1924, the registrar of motor vehicles in Boston determined that the silhouette of a bathing girl was too distracting and banned the decals from cars in the interest of safety.

Trouble shooting tips for Model A Fords " NO SPARK"

In the past few months, I noticed some of the members were having difficulties with the electrical system of their treasured cars. This is not at all uncommon for any eighty plus year old vehicle to have happen from time to time.

I myself over the years have had electrical failures on my various Model A Fords and I thought I would pass along some personal experiences that may help the shade tree mechanic get to the root of the problem as quickly as possible. My background for this trouble shooting comes from my electronics experience and training regarding electrical circuits and I use this practice for my trouble shooting for mechanical problems as well.

For instance, if you do NOT have any spark from your coil wire to ground when you turn your engine over while your key is on,


there is a quick way to see if the trouble is in your wiring, dash, ammeter or safety fuse by simply turning the ignition switch on and either putting a voltmeter (or a six volt test light taillight bulb with one terminal grounded to the engine) to the terminal on the coil which is supplying the voltage from your ammeter.


If you had a dead shorted coil, the coil would blow the safety fuse and you would have to remove the wire from the coil and replace the fuse. If you have 6 volts positive ground on that terminal, it illuminates the switch, terminal box, safety fuse and ammeter and wiring up to the coil and now your troubles lie in a defective part in the distributer or the wire that feeds voltage to the distributor from the coil.

If voltage is at the coil on the input then the next logical step is to pull the threaded lead out of the distributor and check if voltage is present at the terminal that is insulated in the center of the lead. No voltage means an open coil.

If voltage is present you will probably be checking for a short in the distributor by the points terminal, checking the lower plate wire is attached and the short proof condenser that may have shorted out regardless of what they are called when writing about them. (Remember a condenser can't read.)

By taking these three steps, it can reduce your diagnostic time substantially. Again, I am not a mechanic, I am just a guy who has scraped his knuckles with the best of them and bumped his head against a wall time and time again. Soconsider the source and here's hoping this will help someone in the future when they experience "NO SPARK"



something that many of us do not take seriously. Recent studies have shown that one in three Americans have no retirement saving and an additional 23% have less than \$10,000 in retirement savings. Only 53% of working Americans are covered by a retirement plan at work; 23% are covered by a pension and 40% have access to a retirement savings plan, such as a 401k. However, out of those 40%, only 44% actually take advantage of their retirement savings plan. The 47% of Americans not covered by a retirement plan at work have to take accountability of their retirement savings and, according to the studies, many simply do not.

Some people may simply think that they will live comfortably off their social security. Well, if you can maintain your lifestyle on the approximate 40% of their income that social security will likely replace, then you are correct! Frankly, I don't think many can. Plus, it is expected that without legislation, the Social Security Trust Fund will run out of money in 2034. At that time, benefits will have to be paid by the taxes paid by people in the workforce. With 10,000 baby boomers retiring per day, it is projected that these taxes will only support 79% of the benefits being paid. Which will lead to either reduced benefits, or more likely in my opinion, higher payroll taxes for employers and employees.

People often decide that they are going to draw social security as soon as they can, at 62. This is a decision not to be taken likely. It first reduces your full retirement benefit by 26.67% for the rest of your life. It also reduces the amount your spouse can receive; if you hold off drawing social security until full retirement age (67 for those born in 1960 or later), the lower earning spouse is entitled to at least half of the benefit of the higher-earning spouse. Secondly, it limits the amount of additional income you can make to \$17,040 until you reach full retirement age. If you exceed that amount, \$1 of your social security benefit is taken away for every \$3 above the limit. It is quite likely that if you elect early retirement, you are quite likely exiting the work force in your peak earning years, potentially hindering your ability to live your retirement years in the lifestyle you would like.

A key consideration on whether to draw your social security early is your honest assessment of your longevity. The break-even on whether to draw social security at 62 vs. your full retirement age is approximately 17 years, or at 79. If you wait to draw social security until 70, the break-even is approximately 82. Let's use an example of a person eligible for \$25,000 of social security at 62. If he/she waits until full retirement age of 67, that benefit would be \$35,766 and at 70 it would be \$43,720 or a difference of \$18,720 a year. In addition, your spouse would receive half of that benefit if hers/his calculated benefit is less than that. Also, keep in mind that the surviving spouse bumps up to the decedent spouse's benefit if it is higher.

The decision on when to begin drawing on social security is a personal one, yet one of the most important decisions you will make in your retirement planning. While the government has tightened some loopholes on strategies to maximize your benefit.
