Rolex Watches

Rolex watches were first marketed in 1908. They were originally made in London, but after WWI, the company moved to Geneva due to a better economy.

Men's wristwatches did not become widely acceptable until after WWI, when their value was proven in the trenches. Until that point, they were considered too feminine.

Woman's wrist watches have been around since the 1800s, although they were only for royalty and the very rich at first. But they soon became popular as much as exclusive jewelry as they were for telling the time.

The ad shown here is from a 1930-31 Jeweler's catalog, and it features watches prices from \$25 to \$100. Now before you get too excited, in today's prices, that would be from \$400 to \$1700 dollars. Still, probably a bargain since currently the most inexpensive Rolex starts at over \$5000.

The "Rolex Prince" model was available in 14k white or green gold. Interestingly, the price differed according to if you wanted a "government certificate of timekeeping." \$50 without, \$100 with the certificate.

Other models on this page were available in gold filled or white gold, as well as a few being of green gold. Green gold is gold with only a slight hint of green, and is a mix of gold and silver, and perhaps zinc or nickel added for durability. White gold was first commercially available in 1912, but became popular in the 1920s. It has alloys of zinc, silver, and nickel mixed with gold.

The first Rolex Oyster watches were sold in 1926 and were the first waterproof and dustproof wristwatch. This line of Rolex watches is still made today, although with various improvements over the years.

The lady's watches were more delicate than the men's and more ornate as well. The watch in the top right is 14k white gold, with four sapphires and six diamonds!

As you might tell from reading this recipe, it's from a Crisco cookbook. It was common for companies to promote their products with recipes books back then. This recipe is from 1931.

Molasses Crumb Pie

Liquid

1/2 cup molasses 1 egg yolk 1/2 tsp baking soda dissolved in 3/4 cup boiling water

<u>Crumbs</u>

3/4 cup flour	1/2 cup brown sugar
2 Tbs Crisco	1/4 tsp salt
1/2 tsp cinnamon	1/2 tsp nutmeg
1/2 tsp ginger	1/2 tsp cloves
100	

To make crumbs, combine flour, sugar, salt, spices—work in Crisco. To make liquid, beat molasses, egg yolk, soda and hot water. Line pan with Crisco pastry, Make alternate layers of crumbs and liquid. Top with crumbs. Bake in hot oven Z(450°F) until crust edges start to brown. Reduce heat (375° F.). Bake until firm (about 20 min.). Serve with sweetened whipped cream.

<u>Crisco Pastry</u>: Sift 1 1/2 cups flour with 1/2 tsp salt. Cut in 1/2 cup Crisco with knives or fork (to make flaky layers as sweet as Crisco itself.) Add only enough cold water (4 to 6 Tbs) to hold ingredients together. Roll out on a lightly floured board.



Brands We Still Know By Sherry Wink

Clayton Howell was the founder of the Orange Crush Company, which sold "Howell's Orange Julep." In 1911, he teamed up with a chemist by the name of Neil Ward who perfected the blending process for a new orange soda. At that time, real orange pulp was used in the drink. In 1916, they incorporated the company as "The Orange Crush Bottling Company." After improvements made to the



formula that year, they marketed the drink as "Ward's Orange Crush." The word crush was a reference to the process of extracting orange peel oil used in the drink. By 1924 there were roughly 1200 Orange Crush bottlers internationally. Real orange pulp was eliminated from the formula in 1930.

Interesting note: The company was so successful, they were able to contract Norman Rockwell to paint twelve illustrations for their advertisements in 1919.

This is an accelerator spring which mounts onto the throttle assembly to return the gas pedal to the idle position. Did you know?!





An interesting article found in the "Motometer," the Utah Valley Model A Club official newsletter:

<u>Kingpin Removal</u>

By Frank Schray Illustrated by Norm Ellis



In an attempt to rebuild the front end of my 1929 pickup, I encountered extreme difficulty in removing the two kingpins. They would not turn and/or pull out. I saturated the spindles and kingpins with penetrating oil, placed a four-ton hydraulic jack under the kingpin, and using a 7/16 socket on the end of a three-inch extension from the socket set.

I aligned the extension with the socket at the bottom of the kingpin with the extension sitting on top of the jack. A 3-1/2-inch head stud can be placed up through the kingpin and into the 7/16 socket to stabilize the two together. I jacked up the front end of the car with the hydraulic jack about 1/2-inch, using a 10-inch pipe wrench with a 24-inch pipe for leverage. I turned the kingpin back and forth.

At first, it was very difficult to turn the kingpin, but with numerous applications of penetrating oil, the kingpin started to rotate. After about 10 minutes, the front end dropped back on the car jack, and the kingpin moved up. I continued the procedure until the kingpin broke loose and was easily removed. It took about 45 minutes per side.

Oh, for the Lack of a Fire Extinguisher!



If you have a carburetor that is leaking a bit, take care of that problem or you could experience this problem.

Also, don't forget that you should be carrying a fire extinguisher.

Fires can also start when the

leaking gas soaks an air filter accessory on the carburetor. If you have one, take it off.

The report on this picture said the owner was standing aside and watching his roadster go up in flames. Sad tale but a good reminder.

Do YOU carry a Fire Extinguisher?

The summer touring season is underway and it's a good time to inspect your fire extinguisher. If it's past its useful date, there is no time like the present to replace or upgrade it. Don't let your car look like the one in the article to the left!

The Old Lady has a Element E50 fire extinguisher that measures 1" in diameter and 1 foot long. It is good for all types of fires and works for 50 seconds, a much longer time than many popular tank extinguishers. The discharge is safe to breathe and is both non -corrosive and non-toxic. It is attached with a magnetic clip that stays firmly attached to my dash, just to the left of the

steering wheel. It's out of the way, but easily and quickly accessible in an emergency. It's also easy to detach and tuck away during car shows.





Gasoline Ration Stickers

If you have been in the "old Car" hobby for a while, chances are that you've seen gas ration stickers in the right corner of the windshields of antique cars. When World War II broke out, the U.S. Office of the Price Administration (OPA) rationed gasoline on May 15, 1942 on the east coast, and nationwide that December to assist in the war effort. This was in reaction to shortages of gasoline, and stickers were introduced to control the amount of gasoline that the public consumed.

By law, the stickers had to be affixed to the lower right side of the windshield. Most car hobbyists have seen the "A" gas ration sticker, but there were several more types issued. The "A" sticker was the most common and was issued to the general public. To get the sticker, you had to certify that you needed gasoline and that you owned no more than 5 tires, which were also rationed during the war.

The "B" sticker was issued to business owners. It allowed them to get more fuel for their business vehicles.

The "C" sticker was issued primarily to professional people, physicians, nurses, dentists, ministers, priests, Mail delivery, embalmers, farm workers, construction or maintenance workers, soldiers and armed forces going on active duty, and several others. The interesting thing about the "C" sticker is that there was list of 17 different occupations and check boxes at the bottom of the form that the person had to check off to qualify for the sticker. In reality, the "C" sticker was probably the most common during the war, as many people tried to qualify to get more gasoline. However, after the war, most "C" sticker users scraped it off their windshield, as they didn't want the world to know their profession.

The "M" sticker was issued to motorcycle owners. This included telegraph delivery and other messenger services who used motorcycles for their business. The "T" sticker was issued to truck drivers. The "X" sticker was issued in special instances for high mileage type jobs such as traveling salesmen.

Reproductions of many of these stickers are available, and they add to the vehicle's restoration.

Tiny Tip: A Tool for Touring?

A while back, I purchased a Ryobi One+ Inflator. The first time I used it was to top off the Model A tires before going to the Off. It worked quite well in taking the tires from 32 to 35 PSI. Took it along to the Dust-Off to discuss it and the merits of including it in the Model A Tool box.	Dust-
We have all seen the cigarette lighter inflators that will maybe handle an air mattress in 5 to 10 minutes, with a full size tire looking like a pipe dream. Thanks to Bob Barker, we were able to try this on a fully deflated Model A Tire.	
It took 4 minutes to inflate the tire to 35 pounds, and took less than 1/4 of a 3Ah battery. The hose can be difficult to lock on the valve stem, especially the original metal, but it worked and was easier than a hand pump.	•
The mainshort comings I see with this are that while inflating, the built in pressure display will read high, but drop back to the true reading when the trigger is released. The other is that my display reads 2 psi high when compared to a traditional tire gauge. Neither one is a show stopper.	
For long trips, the latest Ryobi chargers are smaller than the batteries and easy to pack. Care is needed when storing the batteries in areas that will get hot, but I think it should be considered for the Model A Tool Kit. The Home Depot site lists this	is item

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
