Sherry informed of Club's website receiving MAFCA first place award.



lately, check it out!





Aprons were a required garment in the households of the Model A era. But that didn't mean they had to be dowdy. The aprons pictured here are from the Frederick Herrschner Inc Art Needlework catalog, dated 1928.

These aprons were sold stamped up with embroidery patterns, ready to be embellished by hand by the purchaser. The examples here all seem to use simple stitches, including straight or outlining stitches, daisy stitches, and French knots. It makes sense that a utility garment would not require elaborate handwork. And likewise, the fabric is mostly simple Chambray, unbleached muslin, and broadcloth are a few too. examples. Of course, like anything, there were a few nice options. Lawn, voile, and even fine gingham were also available.

Just because the fabric was simple didn't mean the designs were. These aprons come in such a wide variety of styles! Lace-trimmed, ruffled, dropped waists, and an assortment of collar and tie styles. Check out the bottom right for a few especially unique and elegant styles! note the use of color in the design. Not just white, rose, blue, and green are used as design elements in most of these aprons. It's pretty clear from these examples that housewives liked to feel pretty too!







As you can probably tell, this recipe is from a Kraft cheese advertisement. I found it in a Good Housekeeping magazine, December 1928.

Kraft Crab Delight

1 egg, slightly beaten 1/2 tsp Worcestershire sauce

Cook green pepper in butter for 5 minutes, blend in flour; add seasonings, tomatoes, cheese and egg; cook a few minutes. Heat the milk before adding the other ingredients, then crab meat.

Serve in patty shells or on rounds of toast. Save 1 tablespoon of cheese to be sprinkled on top when serving.

Brands We Still Know By Sherry Wink

Phillip Drackett was a pharmacist in Sunday and no plumber Cleveland, Ohio who was also could be found interested in chemistry. Drackett, along with his wife Sallie, started a bulk chemical company in 1910, locating it in Cincinnati. Their adult sons, Phillip Jr., and Harry joined the company in 1915. The name was changed to P.W. Drackett & Sons Co. at that time. Products sold included Epson salts, ammonia, and lye in their raw chemical forms. In 1923, Harry developed "Drâno", a drain cleaner in crystal form using lye, a corrosive chemical made by leaching wood ashes, and bits of aluminum for a fizzing action. Becoming Drackett Co. in 1933, they held a lock on the drain cleaning The market for almost fifty years. market was huge, because of the

amount of housing built with indoor plumbing during the prosperous years following WWI.

Note: The original Drâno was a crystal form that couldn't be used in water. It wasn't until 1966 that Liquid Drâno was introduced, which allowed the product to be used on clogged drains with standing water.

Brown-Bedford-Cord



This article idea all started in September of 2018 when club member Ralph Eberspacher sent in photos of his original front seat covers in his unrestored 68C Cabriolet. The seat covers had been amazingly preserved under 2 layers of custom upholstery that had been added over the many years of the life of the car that had been a daily driver, commuting from New



Jersey into New York City up until 1973. One of Ralph's questions was where could he find this original seat fabric which was a much darker version of the Bedford Cord that vintage upholstery suppliers such as LeBaron Bonney (at that time), and Cartouche were providing. They only had a Tan Bedford Cord, which is widely used in many Model A Fords, including the Cabriolet from February 1930 until July 1930.

The problem is that this "Brown Bedford Cord", as it is referred as in The Judging Standards, and the Color, Upholstery and Production Facts Book, used for Cabriolets after July of 1930 is basically a fabric that is scarce or non-existent, therefore making it very difficult to restore a late 68B, or 68C Cabriolet correctly if you want the original cloth fabric front seat. Classtique had the Brown Bedford Cord avail-able for a while, but has long run out and cannot find a supplier for more of the fabric. Owners of 68Cs have the option to up-holster the front seat with Brown Crush Grain Leather, which was an option for the 68C only.



Now there is a little humor here, I, Tom Krueger, was corre-sponding with Tom Moniz, who was corresponding with Tom Rut on the JSC. At times it got just a little confusing as to which Tom was talking to the other Tom, or as Torn (Moniz) put it, "too many Toms, LOU"!

The bad news here, if you are restoring your late 68B (after July 1930) or 68C Cabriolet for Fine Point Judging, is that if you have a front seat that is reupholstered in Tan Bedford Cord it is allegedly incorrect. That being said, we have seen many times where stock on hand was used up in the various Model A production plants before the new changes were actually implemented, so there definitely could be a few late 68Bs that have the Tan Bedford Cord seat fabric as original.

Antifreeze History

An anecdotal history I read online is that that antifreeze was not invented, it was discovered. Back in the days, when chemical or any other plants were allowed to just dump liquid waste directly into the river., the Union Carbide plant in South Charleston, West Virginia noticed that a waste product was melting the ice in the Kanawha River. They promptly began marketing this previously wasted product as antifreeze. I don't know if this story is true, but I did read it in several sources.

Water was the first cooling fluid used in vehicles. But obviously it has major drawbacks such as freezing at 32°F, and boiling at a relatively low temperature compared to engine operating temperatures.

Alcohol, usually a form of methyl alcohol, was used for a while, but it was corrosive and evaporated easily in the open cooling systems used in the early automotive years.

Glycerol was used for a short time, but it was quite expensive to manufacture at the time.

Ethylene glycol which was developed back in 1859, had many of the same properties as glycerol, and a lower freezing point. It was first used as antifreeze in military vehicles in WWI due to its lower freezing point and availability. It was first used as a form of antifreeze in the civilian market in 1926. Prestone claims to have marketed the first Ethylene Glycol Antifreeze in 1927.

The ads on this page from 1928 through 1931. As you can see, antifreeze was marketed guite extensively!

Winter Storage Tips

Since I never know when I drive my 'A' for the last time of the season. I don't perform all of these functions myself. But like we all told our kids when growing up... Do as I say, not as I do...

- Exterior Wash Thoroughly clean the entire outside of the car, and apply a coat of wax. Don't overlook the brightwork (chrome & nickel).
- 2. Interior Clean Vacuum and clean the upholstery. Polish the brightwork. Set an open box of mothballs on the floor to repel insects, mice, etc.
- Lubrication Change the oil, and lube the chassis, hinges and other moving parts.
- 4. Fuel With ethanol in our gas now, the current thinking here is to DRAIN every last drop and store your car with a dry tank.
- Battery The electrolyte should be filled to the proper level and the battery fully charged. If you remove the battery don't store it on the concrete floor. Charging the battery occasionally is OK, but not for the entire winter! (Use a battery tender or 'trickle charger'.)
- 6. Antifreeze Ensure that the radiator is full and the coolant has the appropriate level of freeze and rust protection.
- 7. Tires Clean and spray the tires on both sides to protect against cracks. Some guys put the car up on jack stands to prevent flat spots... (I've never seen the need myself.)

Moths can to serious damage to the upholstery in your Model A. I found some aromatic cedar sachets at Walmart, 4 to a package. They'll keep the moths out and make the

good inside. They also sell cedar blocks that would work as well. You don't want to use moth balls as the smell will stay around forever and is toxic in enclosed spaces.



There are several good mouse repellant you can buy. I found "Fresh Cab Mouse Repellant" and "Grandpa Gus's Natural Mouse Repellent Pouches " at Menards, both of these should work well. I have heard clothes dryer sheets or peppermint oil will keep the mice out but I haven't tested this.





Heaters in the days of the Model A Ford


