Proposed Bylaws Changes

The Board has reviewed our current bylaws and feels some updates are appropriate. Below, please find the pertinent sections that have had changes proposed. Please review these changes carefully and be prepared to vote on these changes at the February meeting. *Note: All proposed changes, additions, deletions, etc. to current bylaws are indicated in italic and underlined type.*

Current Bylaws

ARTICLE III – MEMBERS; Section 2 – Dues. The dues payable by members shall be in the amount of \$25.00 per year per family membership and shall be payable by the first day of January of each year. If joining after January thirty-first, dues for the remainder of the year shall be prorated in the amount of \$2.00 per remaining month.

ARTICLE III – MEMBERS; Section 4 – Recognition. A member or members may be recognized for outstanding service to and for the betterment of the club throughout the year. This will normally occur at the annual business meeting in December and will be approved by the Board of Directors.

Proposed Bylaws changes

ARTICLE III - MEMBERS; Section 2 - Dues. The dues payable by members shall be in the amount of \$25.00 per family membership and shall be payable by the first day of January of each year. If joining after January thirty-first, dues for the remainder of the year shall be prorated in the amount of \$2.00 per remaining month. Adjustments in the dues structure may only be made by affirmative vote of the membership.

ARTICLE III - MEMBERS; Section 4 -- Recognition. A member or members may be recognized, *normally at year end*, for outstanding service to and for the betterment of the club throughout the year. *This recognition is awarded with approval by the Board of Directors.*

ARTICLE III - MEMBERS; <u>NEW SECTION 5 -Voting</u>. <u>All issues to be voted on shall be decided by a simple majority of those present at the time and place the vote takes place, except as otherwise noted in these bylaws. All dues paying members and 2nd members (as recognized in the club's roster) shall have one vote. At time of voting, the manner of voting shall be determined by the Presiding Officer, in his or her discretion, except that any member may, by regular motion, propose an alternative method.</u>

ARTICLE IV - MEETING OF MEMBERS

ARTICLE IV -- MEETINGS OF MEMBERS; NEW SECTION 1-Quorum. Quorum requirements for the conduct of club business shall be established for all meetings as specified herein and in no case shall business be conducted absent a quorum having been established.

ARTICLE IV – MEETING OF MEMBERS; Section 4 – Special Meetings. A special meeting of the membership may be called by two club officers or by no less than one tenth of the total membership due to extraordinary circumstances. If time permits, a written or printed notice stating the place, date and time of such special meeting along with its purpose shall be delivered to each member not less than five days prior to such meeting. If time constraints do not permit the above notification may be made by telephone but in no case less than forty eight hours prior to said meeting. Any action taken at a special meeting must be approved by the general membership to become effective.

ARTICLE V – OFFICERS; Section 1 – Officers. The officers of the club shall be the President, the Vice President, the Secretary, the Treasurer and such other officers as may be duly elected. All officers of the club shall be members of the Model A Ford Club of America (MAFCA) and the Model A Restorers Club (MARC).

ARTICLE V – OFFICERS; Section 2 – Election/Term of Office. The Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer of the Club shall be elected at the annual meeting in December. The Vice President will automatically progress to the office of the President when his term as Vice President has been completed. The term of office for the President and the Vice President shall normally be for a period of one year. There will be no term limits on the offices of the Secretary and the Treasurer. The outgoing President will be appointed to the position of Director for a period of two years after completion of his term as President and he/ she shall be ineligible to hold any other club office during this period.

ARTICLE V – OFFICERS; Section 4 – Vice President. In the absence of the President, the Vice President shall perform all duties of the President. He/She agrees when elected that upon completion of their term he/she will automatically assume the office of President. Along with their other duties, the Vice President shall be responsible for arranging entertainment at regular club meetings. The Vice President will audit financial records prepared by the Treasurer on a yearly basis with 2 club members who are appointed by the Vice President.

ARTICLE V – OFFICERS; Section 5 – Secretary. The Secretary shall keep minutes of all regular, board and special meetings, see that all notices are given in accordance with these bylaws, keep a roster of members names and addresses, cause the proper paperwork to be filed yearly to preserve the Clubs charter and non-profit status, and in general perform all other duties incident to the office of Secretary and any other duties as assigned by the President..

ARTICLE V – OFFICERS; Section 6 – Treasurer. The Treasurer shall have charge of and be responsible for all funds, securities and other assets of the Club. He/She shall perform all duties incident to the office of Treasurer including but not limited to, collection, deposit and disbursement of funds, preparing reports as needed and such other duties as may be assigned by the President.

ARTICLE V – OFFICERS; Section 7 – Board of Directors. The Board of Directors shall consist of the President, the Vice President, the Secretary, the Treasurer, two Directors and such other members as appointed by the President and the Vice President. In case a board member cannot fulfill their term the President, with the concurrence of the Board of Directors, will appoint a club member to fill that vacancy.

ARTICLE IV – MEETING OF MEMBERS; Section 5 – Special Meetings. A special meeting of the membership may be called by two club officers or by no fewer than one tenth of the total membership due to extraordinary circumstances. If time permits, a written or printed notice stating the place, date and time of such special meeting along with its purpose shall be delivered to each member not less than five days prior to such meeting. If time constraints do not permit, the above notification may be made by written notice, telephone, and electronic mail but in no case less than forty eight hours prior to said meeting. Any action taken at a special meeting must be approved by the general membership to become effective.

ARTICLE V - OFFICERS; Section 1 - Officers. The officers of the club shall be the President, the Vice President, the Secretary, and the Treasurer. *(delete: "and such other officers as may be duly elected.")* All officers of the club shall be members of the Model A Ford Club of America (MAFCA) and the Model A Restorers Club (MARC).

ARTICLE V - OFFICERS; Section 2 - Election/Term of Office. <u>The</u> officers shall be elected at the annual meeting. A term of office will be one year. There will be no term limits on any elective position, except that of the President, who may serve no more than three consecutive terms.

ARTICLE V - OFFICERS; Section 4 - Vice President. In the absence of the President, the Vice President shall perform all duties of the President. Those who serve as Vice President do so with an expectation of succeeding to the office of President. Along with his/her other duties, the Vice President shall be responsible for coordinating the Board members' arrangements for programs and/or entertainment at regular club meetings. The Vice President will audit financial records prepared by the Treasurer on a yearly basis with two (2) club members who are appointed by the Vice President.

ARTICLE V - OFFICERS; Section 5 - Secretary. The Secretary shall keep minutes of all regular, board and special meetings, see that all notices are given in accordance with these bylaws, keep a roster of members names and addresses, <u>act as repository of all official Club Documents to insure the continuous operation of the Club</u>, and in general perform all other duties relevant to the office of Secretary and any other duties as assigned by the President.

ARTICLE V - OFFICERS; Section 6 - Treasurer. The Treasurer shall perform all duties relevant to the office of Treasurer including but not limited to acceptance, deposit, and disbursement of funds, maintenance of accurate financial records, selection and maintenance of bank accounts in the Club name, assistance in budget preparation and fund raising activities, reporting of financial forms (including IRS 990 and MO Secretary of State), making monthly financial reports to the membership and board, and such other duties as may be assigned by the President.

ARTICLE V - OFFICERS; Section 7 - Board of Directors. The function of the Board shall be to provide leadership and direction in the implementation of club activities and programs that (1) adhere to club bylaws, purposes, and applicable non-profit organization laws and regulation; (2) ensure prudent use and preservation of club assets; (3) provide oversight in day-to-day operations of the club's committees. The Board of Directors shall consist of the elected officers, two (2) elected directors-at-large, and such other members as are appointed by the President and the Vice President. In case a board member cannot fulfill his or her term the President, with concurrence of the Board, will appoint a club member to fill that vacancy.

the help of his grandchildren, it was soon back on the road!



































Oil Filter for the New Ford


THE Dunn Simplex Oil Filter for Model A Ford Cars is an efficient unit that allows the overflow oil from the valve chamber to percolate through a receptacle packed with filtering felt which catches and holds the minutest particles of sediment. It is claimed to have a capacity of one gallon every ten minutes, cleaning the oil several times every hour the engine is in operation. Such oil, it is

pointed out, may be used much longer than unfiltered, and in the saving thus effected, the Simplex soon pays for itself. In addition, engine life is prolonged by removing metal cuttings, sand

and road grit from the oil, which would otherwise act as an abrasive when carried by the oil to the polished bearing surfaces of the engine. Should the filtering medium become clogged or inoperative, the oil by-passes the unit. resuming its regular course through the oil return pipe. as though the filter was not in place. The filter is cleaned every five thousand miles, which is a simple operation. They are packed one in a carton and priced attractively. Address the Dunn Mfg. Men's Overcoats

Every have the desire to do a little Model A Styling in cooler weather? Well check out these men's fashions from the 1930 Bond Street Summer and Winter styles. This illustration is from a CD/e-download available from MAFCA that is focused just on Men's styles. Called "Stepping Out in Style", it's available for purchase from the MAFCA.com web site for \$5.50 for immediate download or \$11 postage paid for a CD. This CD has 58 pages from men's catalogs showing suits, topcoats, etc from Model A years.

Regarding the illustration to the right, note that the single button style topcoats (942 & 943) have only three buttons. This was the norm for the era from all the men's catalogs I have reviewed. Indeed, even most men's suits also used three buttons, with the exception being suit jackets marketed toward the younger college men, which at times used only two buttons. One of these also has raglan sleeves (943) instead of the more often seen fitted style (942). This allows for a looser fit.

The double-breasted version (940) has six buttons, also a normal pattern for the era. I notice that this version has the middle two buttons as part of the belt, which appears be sewn on as ornamentation as much as for practicality.

The last style seen on this illustration is called a "fly front" (941). With this style, the buttons are hidden with a fly, like would be found on the front of pants. It give a slimmer, more stylish finish to the coat.

It's hard to believe that these were considered spring or summer coats, but perhaps made out of light weight fabrics, they wouldn't be as warm as they look!

I found this interesting recipe in a 1928 cookbook from Baker's brand powdered cocoa. It sounds pretty yummy, but a little labor intensive. It might be worth it if you're a marshmallow fan! Did you know that in the 20's and 30's, marshmallows were sold in tins, not bags?

Cocoa Marshmallow Pudding

4 1/2 Tbs cornstarch 3 Tbs Baker's Breakfast Cocoa 3 Tbs cold water 3 cups scalded milk 2 egg yolks 1/3 cup sugar 1/2 tsp vanilla

10 marshmallows

Mix cornstarch and cocoa in the cold water and add this to hot milk. Cook the mixture, stirring it constantly until it thickens. ..

Continue cooking in double boiler for at least twenty minutes. Beat egg and add sugar. Then pour hot mixture slowly over egg and sugar. Stir constantly.

Return mixture to double boiler and cook until it thickens.

Add vanilla and marshmallows cut in quarters.

Pour into mold and cool.













Brands We Still Know By Sherry Wink

George Westinghouse invented the airbrake for railroad use in 1869 when he was a 22 year-old engineer. He founded the Westinghouse Electric Company in Pittsburgh in 1886. He was a proponent for Alternating Current, fighting against the Direct Current electrical system pushed by Edison at the time. A major win in this fight was when Westinghouse Electric won a contract to provide generators for the new hydroelectric power station at Niagara

Falls in 1893. George Westinghouse died in 1914 at the age of 67. In 1920 the company set up the first commercial radio station which broadcast in East Pittsburgh. The first electrical appliances for consumers were also introduced in the 1920s. The company offered a variety of products, from electric ranges to smaller household appliances. It introduced a line of electric refrigerators in 1930 and washing machines soon followed. in 1941, Westinghouse entered the military electronics business, with radar as its main product. As it grew, the company was a leading inventor and manufacturer for radar, nuclear power, submarines, and jet engines. In later years, its divisions diversified widely, including electronics, household appliances, radios and broadcasting, TV parts, and Seven-Up soda. This diversification was not widely successful, and by the 90's the company streamlined into a handful of core divisions.

Pinion Gear Removal!

Removing a Model A Ford pinion gear from the drive shaft is not as straightforward as it may appear. The pinion gear has an internal taper that matches the tapered end of the drive shaft and over the years the mating surfaces may have become jammed very tight together, much like a rear brake drum hub can become jammed tight to a rear axle.

The pinion gear can be removed from the drive shaft with a large gear puller and a small bearing puller. Place the drive shaft in a vice. Remove the cotter pin from the nut at the pinion end of the drive shaft. Using a 15/16 hex socket, back the nut off about 1/4 of an inch, but do not remove it. Place a small bearing puller around the drive shaft behind the pinion gear by sliding it on over the front end of the drive shaft until it is up against the threaded end of the pinion gear.

Using the gear puller, place the center point of the puller in the detent at the pinion end of the drive shaft. Hook the arms of the gear puller around the bearing puller and tighten until there is sufficient tension against the end of the drive shaft. Smartly tap the end of the gear puller with a hammer.

Alternately tighten the puller and tap the end until the pinion gear breaks loose from the taper on the end of the drive shaft. Remove the pinion gear nut and slide the pinion gear off the end of the drive shaft.

The photos show a block of steel with a hole bored through it instead of a bearing puller. Since I remove a lot of pinion gears I made up this device, as it is more convenient to use. A small bearing puller will work just as well. The gear puller shown was purchased from Sears years ago and was originally used For pulling flywheels off of a Briggs & Stratton lawn mower engine.

The reason you do not want to remove the nut from the end of the drive shaft until after the pinion gear has broken loose is that the pinion gear may fly across the room when it breaks loose if the nut is not in place to prevent it. \odot

What does 1929 Hold for the Automobile World?

By Alfred Reeves, General Manager of the National Automobile Chamber of Commerce

If there is anyone who believes that it was easier to be an automobile dealer in the so-called "good old days" than today, let him consider some of the advantages which will be present in the motor trade in 1929:

There are good highways everywhere. Half the town is in the prospect class.

Everyone knows how to drive. Any line delivers value per dollar.

Those four points are fundamentals of strength in the motor business which exist at present and were not to be counted on in the initial days of the automobile industry. I do not mean that there are literally good highways in all the directions that we would like to have them. I do not mean literally that every adult knows how to pilot a machine. But speaking from the standpoint of general acceptance these ideas are true. We have accepted the idea that a good road shall be built wherever a good road is necessary. We have accepted the thought that every human being can be taught to drive readily, so that the doubt about the ability to drive is a sales resistance with only a very few persons.

Our federal aid highway system of 180,000 miles is rapidly being brought to completion, yet the plan was initiated only a dozen years ago. There are approximately 600,000 miles of surfaced highways in the United States, and we are building something like 35,000 miles more every year. If one drives through the villages, towns and small cities of this country, one is impressed by the wide main streets with their asphalt, brick or concrete surfaces. One is proud of the excellent street lighting, the motor showrooms and the handsome cars traveling up and down the streets. Compare this picture with any main street of a generation ago, the occasional automobile rattling by, and the horses rearing up in fear at this new device. Compare the situation with conditions today and one can feel only encouragement at the opportunities in the motor trade.

We have a partnership with NATMUS in Auburn, Indiana in which 4 Model A vehicles and a cutaway chassis are on display in a vintage gas station environment.





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RETIREMENT PLANNING - IS SOCIAL SECURITY ENOUGH FOR YOU?



While most of us realize the importance of retirement planning, sadly, it is something that many of us do not take seriously. Recent studies have shown that one in three Americans have no retirement saving and an additional 23% have less than \$10,000 in retirement savings. Only 53% of working Americans are covered by a retirement plan at work; 23% are covered by a pension and 40% have access to a retirement savings plan, such as a 401k. However, out of those 40%, only 44% actually take advantage of their retirement savings plan. The 47% of Americans not covered by a retirement plan at work have to take accountability of their retirement savings and, according to the studies, many simply do not.

Some people may simply think that they will live comfortably off their social security. Well, if you can maintain your lifestyle on the approximate 40% of their income that social security will likely replace, then you are correct! Frankly, I don't think many can. Plus, it is expected that without legislation, the Social Security Trust Fund will run out of money in 2034. At that time, benefits will have to be paid by the taxes paid by people in the workforce. With 10,000 baby boomers retiring per day, it is projected that these taxes will only support 79% of the benefits being paid. Which will lead to either reduced benefits, or more likely in my opinion, higher payroll taxes for employers and employees.

People often decide that they are going to draw social security as soon as they can, at 62. This is a decision not to be taken likely. It first reduces your full retirement benefit by 26.67% for the rest of your life. It also reduces the amount your spouse can receive; if you hold off drawing social security until full retirement age (67 for those born in 1960 or later), the lower earning spouse is entitled to at least half of the benefit of the higher-earning spouse. Secondly, it limits the amount of additional income you can make to \$17,040 until you reach full retirement age. If you exceed that amount, \$1 of your social security benefit is taken away for every \$3 above the limit. It is quite likely that if you elect early retirement, you are quite likely exiting the work force in your peak earning years, potentially hindering your ability to live your retirement years in the lifestyle you would like.

A key consideration on whether to draw your social security early is your honest assessment of your longevity. The break-even on whether to draw social security at 62 vs. your full retirement age is approximately 17 years, or at 79. If you wait to draw social security until 70, the break-even is approximately 82. Let's use an example of a person eligible for \$25,000 of social security at 62. If he/she waits until full retirement age of 67, that benefit would be \$35,766 and at 70 it would be \$43,720 or a difference of \$18,720 a year. In addition, your spouse would receive half of that benefit if hers/his calculated benefit is less than that. Also, keep in mind that the surviving spouse bumps up to the decedent spouse's benefit if it is higher.

The decision on when to begin drawing on social security is a personal one, yet one of the most important decisions you will make in your retirement planning. The government has tightened some loopholes on strategies to maximize your benefit but there are still options.
