Vision Wear

Want to add a little spark to your era look? Think about adding some vintage looking spectacles! It's not as hard as it sounds! If you wear prescription glasses, many of the online eye wear sites have appropriate frames. If no need for a specialty lens, head over to Amazon for an amazing selection of non-RX frames!

A few simple rules—1928-1929, the majority of glasses were round, with some variations of oval or octagon found. Small lens, under 2" are the most accurate. And the temples need to be attached on the side center. In 1930, Ful-vue glasses came out, which moved the temples closer to the top of the frame, allowing better peripheral vision. These had lens shapes closer to the aviator style we have today. Men and women wore the same frames back then. Metal, or acrylic frames which mimic the celluloid used in Model A time, would both look great, and add

The Book of Cookery, The American Housewife Collections Of Recipes is a 1931 cookbook put out by Woman's World magazine from recipes submitted by their subscribers. Recipes were organized by the month and include a monthly reminder; October reminds the housewife that it is important to have sufficient fruit from October until spring, and pork begins to appear on menus once more.

Sweet Cider Cake

1 egg 1 cup sugar 1/3 cup melted shortening 3/4 cup sweet cider 1/4 tsp salt 1/4 tsp cinnamon 1/4 tsp allspice 1/2 tsp soda 1/2 tsp baking powder 2 cups flour



Beat the egg until light, add the sugar

gradually, then the melted shortening, next the cider and lastly the dry ingredients which have been sifted together two or three times. Beat well and bake in a greased loaf cake pan in a moderately hot over. Frost when cool with brown sugar frosting. (Editor's note: This must have been a common frosting recipe as it's not listed in this book!)

Brands We Still Know By Sherry Wink

Eddie Bauer opened a shop in 1920 that specialized in making tennis rackets. Bauer was a skilled craftsman, and soon expanded to making golf clubs, fishing tackle, and other sports equipment. Very quickly he offered an

unconditional lifetime guarantee on his products. After developing hypothermia on a fishing trip in 1923, Bauer began his long-term project focusing on improving cold weather sports wear. In 1929, he married his wife Christine, whose skill at outdoors sports was a match to his. Bauer's research found success in 1940 with a quilted goose down-filled jacket. He called it the "Skyliner." When WWII started, the US Army Air Corps commissioned Bauer to make flight parkas with his design. Bauer's company also made backpacks, pants, and sleeping bags used as standard issue for US troops. The first Eddie Bauer mail order catalog was issued in 1945. It was so successful that Bauer eventually closed his brick-andmortar store and focused on mail order only.

Match length of shaft to rod

How Long is a Horn Rod?

Found in the September, 2022 Issue of the Script A News:

Needing a horn rod, I tried to find the right length to buy. For the keyed shaft, a 30-31 wheel is the right one, and there are three different lengths of horn rod to fit those years. The books weren't any help, as only one of them said the rod should be 'about 7/8 longer than the column itself', and the rest of the research just told of how to measure the rod you had, to get another of the same length. The one book that mentioned the rod being 7/8 longer, did not say whether you measured the entire assembly or just the column shaft, however.

I found a horn rod at the swap meet for \$5, with the insulation broken and missing. Figuring that if it wasn't the right length, I would be only out the \$5. The repair kit cost another \$6, so I would be out a maximum of \$11, and I would know for sure what length I needed.

I started by removing the horn button, by straightening the tabs on the retaining ring, and tapping it out with a punch. I then cut the wire at the lower end and pulling the old wire out through the upper end. I very promptly dropped and lost the rivet that held the wire on the lower end, so it was a good thing there's one in the repair kit!

The insulator supplied would not fit in the rod, so after measuring with a micrometer, I drilled the end of the rod out to .201 inches with a #2 drill. This allowed everything to go together well and after stripping the end of the wire, I spread the strands and soldered them to the rivet supplied.

I next re-assembled the horn button and retaining ring, after polishing everything as best I could. The tabs bent over easily with a channel lock pliers, finishing the job.

A quick check with a VOM showed everything working just fine. Another part finished! After I installed everything, I discovered that the rod needs to be a total length (measured to the end of the rod) of 11/16 longer than the end of the light switch bracket.

I did luck out, and the rod that I purchased turned out to be the right length (officially 45 31/32 inches measured to the keeper groove).

An interesting article found in October 2022 issue of The TALE PIPE, the official newsletter of the Tyler, Texas Model A Ford Club:

Thrust Bearings or - Keep Your Foot off the Clutch Pedal !!!

The Model A Ford engine is equipped with bearings that are designed to limit the fore and aft movement of the crankshaft and keep it centered in the engine block. These thrust bearings surfaces are designed into the rear main bearing of the engine.

The Babbitt bearing material overlaps the front and rear of the rear main bearing bore and is finished machined when the main bearings are line bored. The crankshaft has a flange on both sides of the rear main bearing that is finish ground. These flanges will bear against the thrust surfaces of the rear main bearing Babbitt and keeps the crankshaft centered.

Normally there is very little for or aft load on these thrust surfaces but that all changes when you put your foot on the clutch. It takes considerable force to push on the fingers of the clutch to cause it to release. This force wants to push the crank- shaft toward the front of the engine and up against the rear thrust surface of the rear main bearing. Extended use of the clutch or using a heavy duty clutch with stiff springs will increase the load on the thrust bearing which can lead to premature wear.



The Model A crankshaft thrust bearings were not over designed and it is not uncommon at all to find the rear thrust bearing all worn out. When Henry designed the Model B engine, the crankshaft bearing diameters and the thrust bearing surface areas were increased and the lubrication to the rear thrust surface was improved.

You will find many Model A engines that are in good condition and should run for many more miles but the rear thrust bearing material is badly worn or missing entirely. Now what do you do if you have an otherwise perfectly good engine that has a bad thrust bearing?

The better parts supplier offer a replacement rear main oil seal insert that is made out of brass and incorporates a new thrust surface for the rear flange of the crank. With a little work, this part can often be installed without removing the engine. At this time, there is not a similar part

g available for the Model B engine. How do you prevent this from happening with your Model A? The best thing you can do to

life easier for your thrust bearings is to KEEP YOUR FOOT OFF THE CLUTCH !!!

When you come to a stop light and you find you may have to wait for a period of time before you can proceed, put the transmission in neutral and take your foot off the clutch pedal. This will take the load off the thrust bearing and also will take the clutch load off the throw out bearing which will add to its life.

Another thing you can do is to adjust the clutch so it has a lot of free play, or engages when the pedal is closer to the floor. This will reduce the amount the springs in the clutch assembly are compressed which reduces the forward load on the crankshaft. Just be sure the clutch will fully release when the pedal is fully depressed.

When rebuilding the engine or replacing the clutch assembly, consider using a Later ford "V-8" clutch or a more modern diaphragm clutch. These clutches take Less force to disengage and not only will it be easier to push the clutch pedal down but they also lessen the load on the throw out bearing and the crankshaft thrust bearing.

Remember, when waiting at a stop light, put the transmission in neutral and TAKE YOUR FOOT OFF THE CLUTCH PEDAL!!
